What is PAHERP:

PAHERP - short for the Pennsylvania Herpetological Education and Resource Project - is an online resource center for the conservation of reptiles and amphibians of Pennsylvania. Our slogan **ID-Submit-Conserve** goes along with all three steps of PAHERP.



ID - The PA HERP Identification site is an educational portal for individuals to learn information about each species in Pennsylvania. Each species has detailed photos, habitat information, a range map and information on color and characteristics.

Submit - The PA HERP Database is an important step to involve the public in data collection and online submission for all 76 herptile species of Pennsylvania. This data will aid in research, conservation and educational outreach throughout the state, and will provide educational publications and resources to aid in herp awareness in Pennsylvania.

Conserve - Data submitted on all tracked reptile and amphibian species will be organized by the Pennsylvania Herpetological Atlas and forwarded to the PFBC and Pennsylvania Natural Heritage Program for entry into the PNHP database. Thus, critical information on the location of these species will be available for conservation planning and decision making.



Conservation Needs:

Pennsylvania is home to an extraordinarily diverse array of amphibian and reptile species. Many of these species have either shown evidence of population decline or have life-history traits that make them susceptible to decline. Pennsylvania's Comprehensive Wildlife Conservation Strategy presently lists 36 reptile and amphibian species as priority species. Unfortunately, accurate data on the distribution and abundance of many of these species is limited or lacking. The cryptic nature of amphibians and reptiles, their tendency to be active under restricted environmental conditions, and their sparse distribution over wide areas make it difficult to accurately survey their presence and abundance.

While a professional biologist can only survey one location at a time, countless people involved in outdoor recreation across the state regularly come in contact with native amphibian and reptile species. The PAHERP Database gives the public a chance to help with conservation and research on the amphibians and reptiles of Pennsylvania. The data collected will aid in determining the range of many species within the state and help provide a better understanding of their present status.

Getting Involved:

People of all ages can get involved with the conservation of Pennsylvania's reptiles and amphibians. If you are reading this brochure, you probably love the outdoors and understand the importance of preserving wildlife.

Whether you are a parent, teacher, park ranger, counselor, or just want to know more information, we have developed learning materials, activities and lesson plans for you. These plans were designed for your learning and to aid you in educating others.

If you have a project in mind but can not find the information you need on our web site, let us know. The opportunities are endless. We have a knowledgeable group of herpetologists and volunteers who can assist you in your research.
